Opioids remain the gold standard for treatment of the highly distressing pain from cancer and its treatment, but it can cause considerable harm when used inappropriately. Thus, measures to protect vulnerable patients, their loved ones, and the community from opioid-associated harms when opioids are the ethical choice for pain relief are critically needed.



The 4th Pain and Opioid Crisis Seminar seeks to address this need by bringing together a wide range of participants and world expert faculty with diverse clinical and research backgrounds in pain and opioids. This exciting educational event will provide practical evidence-based guidance and solutions to address clinical, public health, and legal issues related to the use and non-medical use of opioids and ultimately improve patient outcomes.

Attendees will obtain up-to-date information and acquire high-quality knowledge while earning valuable CE credits and Maintenance of Certification (MOC) points from the American Board of Internal Medicine (ABIM) and American Board of Anesthesiology (ABA).

EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES

After attending the seminar, participants should be able to:

- Apply the basic principles of pain management and chronic opioid therapy;
- Utilize practical strategies to manage patients with co-occurring cancer pain and non-medical opioid use;
- Implement ways to improve patient care and ensure patient/family safety related to the use of opioids; and
- Apply non-pharmacologic approaches to manage pain in patients with opioid use disorder.

TARGET AUDIENCE

This program will be of interest to all health care providers including those who prescribe opioids (medical oncologists, pain and palliative care physicians, emergency room physicians, primary care physicians, doctors of osteopathic medicine, advanced practice providers), administer opioids (nurses, pharmacists), or are involved with patients on opioids (psychiatrists, psychologists, social workers, case managers, and clinical leaders). It will also be relevant to other stakeholders including policy makers.

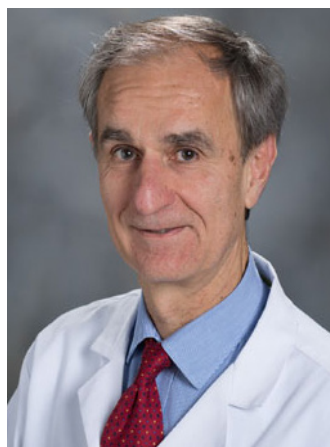
