Opioids remain the gold standard for treatment of the highly distressing pain from cancer and its treatment, but it can cause considerable harm when used inappropriately. Thus, measures to protect vulnerable patients, their loved ones, and the community from opioid-associated harms when opioids are the ethical choice for pain relief are critically needed.
