Clinical evidence supports the use of opioid analgesics as the gold standard to treat cancer-related pain. Unfortunately, the opioid crisis has brought renewed attention and scrutiny to opioid prescriptions, thereby creating a dilemma in patient management. Clinicians are required to carefully balance the judicious prescription of opioids with the risk for nonmedical opioid use to ensure that our patients receive safe and excellent care for their pain..

The 6th Pain and Opioid Crisis Seminar

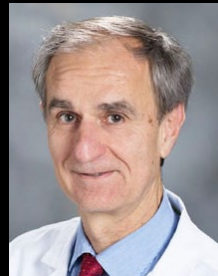
